26th December, 2025







458 trainees from the 41st and 42nd Lower Courses were included in this total, reflecting a broad commitment to career progression within the ranks. Through the proactive management of the Mechanical and Wireless Labs, these trainees gained vital hands-on experience with specialized equipment and vehicles. Furthermore, the integration of LED-enabled classrooms ensured the effective delivery of legal education, ensuring all officers are well-versed in the rigorous standards and laws required for higher ranks.

135 trainees successfully completed 36th and 37th Intermediate Class Courses under the in-service promotional program, strengthening their academic insight and operational skills. Notably, 36th intermediate course also accommodated 40 officers from Lahore Ring Road Police.

12th Recruit Class

833 recruits, including 107 females and 726 males, joined the 12th and 13th Basic Recruit Courses in 2025, continuing until the end of the year.

TRAINING OF RING ROAD POLICE



40 officers of the Lahore Ring Road Police successfully completed the 39th Intermediate Class Course in 2025, marking another milestone in NHMP's collaborative training efforts. The program offered advanced instruction in traffic management, road safety, and legal procedures, equipping officers to handle complex operational situations.

93 Road Safety programs were conducted in 2025 by the Road Safety Awareness Unit of NHMP Training College Sheikhpura, including seminars, workshops, quizzes, and special awareness events. Through consistent field engagement, the unit promoted traffic discipline and the message “Life is Precious,” ensuring impactful community outreach.

31 Factories and organizations were visited to brief industrial workers who commute daily. Awareness focused on fatigue management, vehicle fitness, and safe commuting practices to reduce road risks. Throughout 2025, the unit remained steadfast in its mission to transform road user behavior through consistent engagement and structured learning.



The mission to establish a state-of-the-art center for road safety education reached a monumental breakthrough in 2025. This ambitious journey culminated in the strategic acquisition of 106 Kanals and 15 Marlas of land, transitioning the institution from conceptual planning to practical execution. This land acquisition will facilitate the construction of advanced infrastructure to meet future needs, including staff welfare projects like family quarters and a swimming pool, to further enhance training standards.

Alongside this expansion, the Training College oversaw five major infrastructure projects, including the Phase-III Command Office and a 750-seat auditorium. Further developments including a modernized Service Block, a renovated Sports Complex, and a specialized Store Kot building mark a new era.



SECURITY ENHANCEMENTS



In 2025, Training College undertook a comprehensive upgrade of its security protocols to provide a safe and professional environment. The integration of a digitized Visitor Management System, regular weekly inspections, and reinforced hostel gates have strengthened and improved physical security.

The operational footprint expanded to eleven active security posts, supplemented by mobile patrols, rooftop surveillance, and increased personnel presence at hostel blocks. Tactical and communication infrastructure was upgraded, including armed details at key academic and administrative locations and a restricted outer-cordon parking system. These measures collectively ensure continuous vigilance and rapid response capabilities.

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SPORTS FESTIVAL



Training College once again took center stage by successfully hosting the 12th Annual Sports Festival. This prestigious event returned after a two-year hiatus, bringing with it a renewed sense of vigor, enthusiasm, and professional pride. Serving as the host for the 12th consecutive year, the Training College upheld its tradition of excellence by providing best arrangements and warm hospitality to all participating units.

The festival commenced with a colorful opening ceremony, which set the tone for the days to follow. The ceremony was graced by Addl. IGP, Mr. Saad Bharwana, as the Chief Guest. CULTURAL NIGHT



Together, these modern facilities provide a perfect balance of academic research and physical training. RENOVATION AND BEAUTIFICATION



During 2025, high-quality wall paneling was completed across six key locations, including the admin branch, academic branch, Moharrar office, IT lab, library, and gymnasium. This upgrade ensures that the facility remains clean and aesthetically pleasing despite the daily footfall of 1,000 under-training officers.



Furthermore, an in-house nursery of flowering plants has been established to promote greenery across the campus. The college's external environment has been further revitalized with upgraded street lights to enhance visibility and safety for all personnel. Additionally, a new public parking facility was established outside the boundary wall, offering streamlined access for DLA Facilitation Centre visitors.





DIGITAL BAND AND TRAINEE BIOMETRIC SYSTEM



In 2025, the college achieved a significant milestone in modernization by introducing a digital band. This innovation addressed the shortage of skilled musicians while markedly enhancing drill discipline through its consistent rhythm. Remarkably, the digital band provided musical accompaniment for the first-ever passing-out parade of In-Service Promotion Courses in college's history.



Complementing this, the institution replaced its manual attendance system with advanced biometric scanners installed at the Moharrar office and trainee hostels.
